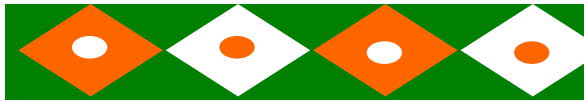
The parents at Wellstone helped develop this Compact for Achievement. School-wide meetings are held each year to update the compact. Parents are welcome to contribute comments at any time.

District Goals for Student Achievement

All students are at grade level and making growth in these areas:

- Pre-Kindergarteners on target in reading
- 3rd graders at grade level in reading and math
- 5th graders at grade level in reading, math and science

Decrease the gaps between student groups in:

- Grade-level learning, measured by MCAs
- Identification for Talent Development and Acceleration Services
- Referral to Special Education
- Absences
- Suspensions

School Goals

Reading: The percentage of 3rd-5th grade students scoring proficient or higher in reading will increase from 18% to 40% by Spring 2017 as measured by the MCA.

Math: The percentage of 3rd-5th grade students scoring proficient or higher in math will increase from 23% to 40% by Spring 2017 as measured by the MCA .

Teachers, Parents, Students—Together for Success

In the 2nd Grade Classroom

The 2nd grade team will work with students and their families to support students' success in reading and math. Some of our key connections with families will be:

- We will send home bi-weekly newsletter with information about what the students are learning in school, and provide parents with home learning activities to promote reading and language development.
- We encourage families to read and tell stories to their children everyday. We will provide a template with comprehensive questions to ask your child about what they are reading.
- We will offer Math Night and Family Literacy Night to give parents opportunities to learn some additional activities and strategies they can use at home.
- Our class web page has links to family friendly web sites for building reading and math skills.

At Home

Wellstone parents joined staff to develop ideas about how families can support students success in reading and math. Families may have other ideas to add to this list.

- I will make sure that my child completes their homework.
- I will attend Family events or get information from my child's teacher if we can't attend.
- I will play games with my child using dice, spinners and dominoes to help them with fact power (subtraction and addition.)
- I will read and/or look at a book every night with my child and discuss what the book is about.
- I will look for the bi-weekly class newsletter and check out the school website.
- I have reviewed the PBIS (Positive Behavior Intervention Support) expectations matrix with my child and have assisted him/her in understanding the importance of accepting individual responsibility for his/her actions.

Wellstone Students - My Actions Matter

- Bring home homework and complete assignments.
- Bring home our class newsletter and notices about family events.
- Talk about your school day with your family.
- Attend school on-time everyday, unless a documented excused absence occurs.
- Follow the B.U.S. school-wide expectations (**B**e Responsible, **U**se Respect, **S**afe Community)
